• Local Fire and Police Departments — For the situations where a call to 911 is unnecessary, but you still need some assistance.

• *ICE* (*In Case of Emergency*) — A campaign was started a few years ago by a paramedic to encourage all cell-phone users to list their emergency contacts under ICE in the contacts list. More information about ICE can be found online.

• *Water and Power Departments* — This will save you the hassle of looking up their numbers if you have an emergency. • *Pediatrician, and Poison Control* — An accident involving a child can be very scary. Having these numbers available will help bring order to a stressful situation.



Circus World, Baraboo, Wisconsin

A century ago, Wisconsin was the home or winter quarters of more than 100 traveling tent shows. The most famous of these was the Ringling Bros. Circus, which was founded in Baraboo in 1884. Ringlingville was built along Water Street in Baraboo to house the animals during the winter months when the circus wasn't traveling. Although the circus left town permanently in 1918, when it

merged with the Barnum & Bailey Show, the buildings in Ringlingville remained.

In 1940, John M. Kelley, the Ringlings' personal attorney, envisioned a museum that would preserve the circus artifacts and make them available to be viewed by the public. And so, on July 1, 1959, Circus World Museum opened, serving as both an educational and historical facility. Since its opening, the museum has been owned by the Wisconsin Historical Society.

The museum offers an array of circusrelated activities, performances, and exhibits for people of all ages. More than two-thirds of all known circus wagons in the world are housed at Circus World. Over 9,500 multicolored circus posters, a large collection of photographs, costumes, circus artifacts, handbills, and programs are also on display in the Circus Museum.

In addition to the historical aspect of Circus World, there is a great deal of fun to be had. Daily elephant, camel, and pony rides are available, as are actual live circus performances. Visitors will feel like they have been a part of the circus for the day.

Teach Your Nose to Just Say "No"

Nasal sprays tell the blood vessels in your nose to contract, which slows the blood flow to the lining of the nose, causes the tissue to become less congested, and slows down mucous production. Unfortunately, after several days of repeated use, you will most likely find that you need more of the spray, more often, to achieve the same results. Your nose becomes dependent on the medicine to feel "normal," and your congestion will get worse quickly once the medicine starts to wear off.

The best way to treat nasal allergy symptoms is to speak with your doctor or an allergy specialist. They can help you find the treatment that is right for you.

The Man behind "Peanuts"

"Someday, Charles, you're going to be an artist." Never could Charles M. Schulz's kindergarten teacher imagine the truth of her words. From a very young age, Charles, known to his family and friends as Sparky, loved comics. He and his father shared a Sunday-morning ritual of reading the comics together.

Eager to begin a career as an artist, Schulz instead found himself in the army during WWII. Following his discharge, he returned to his home state of Minnesota and began to pursue his cartooning career. He drew a weekly comic panel, "Li'l Folks," for the St. Paul Pioneer Press from 1947-1950.

After several attempts at syndication, Schulz was rewarded for his efforts on October 2, 1950 when his strip, which had been renamed "Peanuts," was run in seven different papers.

The initial cast of Peanuts included only four characters: Charlie Brown, Shermy, Patty, and Snoopy. Schulz shared many painful childhood experiences through Charlie Brown's character, quickly setting him apart as the lead character. Numerous others were added through the years to create the Peanuts gang we all love.

Schulz was forced into "early retirement" at the age of 77 by a number of health issues. His final original weekday Peanuts strip was published on January 3, 2000; original Sunday strips continued until February 12, which, coincidentally, was the day after Schulz passed away. Although he is greatly missed,

his characters live on in papers around the world.





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recipe

While still in high school she was hired by a local radio station to do the news part-time. Her career took off from there. She is now one of the most recognizable people in the country, if not the world. Oprah has her hands in many different arenas, including television, radio, magazines, and philanthropy.

Crustless Spinach Quiche

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- *1 (10 ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained*
- 5 eggs, beaten
- 3 cups shredded Muenster cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 350°F. Lightly grease a 9-inch pie pan. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onions and cook, stirring occasionally, until soft. Stir in spinach and continue cooking until excess moisture has evaporated. In a large bowl, combine eggs, cheese, salt and pepper. Add spinach mixture and stir to blend. Scoop into prepared pie pan. Bake in preheated oven until eggs have set, about 30 minutes. Let cool for 10 minutes before serving.
